The Course

Sociology is the study of society, of individuals and groups within society and whether we shape society, or society shapes us. Sociology will help you to gain a greater understanding of why people behave in the way that they do. Did my family shape me and what techniques did they use? Why do some people become criminals? Why do some people achieve better academic qualifications? Why does inequality exist; why are some people racist, sexist, discriminatory? Why do or don't I hold the same views?

The course will introduce you to six different sociological perspectives: Functionalist, New Right, Marxist, Feminisms, Post Modernism, Interactionism. You will be taught to evaluate, to make comparisons, judgements about the value, effectiveness and usefulness of each. You will learn to apply concepts from each to our contemporary society and will learn to look at our society from a range of viewpoints.





If you would like a career about or involving people then Sociology may be for you!
